These report cards are available online at screportcards.com. The Report Cards provide information about each school and 00000000 district, including test performance, teacher qualifications, student safety, and other accountability measures.

Schools receive an overall rating of unsatisfactory, below average, average, good, or excellent. Elementary and middle schools are rated on five indicators: academic achievement, student progress, preparing for success, multilingual learner progress, and school climate. High schools are rated on six indicators: academic achievement, preparing for success, multilingual learner progress, graduation rate, college and career readiness, and school climate.
