



# Lexington County 2016 Community Development Block Grant Program

Lexington County Council approved a Lexington County Community Development Block Grant award in the amount of \$41,669 for the after-school program at **Red Bank Elementary**.

RBES currently offers an after-school program, serving about 50 students, that requires parents to pay a fee in order for their children to attend the program.

The Community Development Block Grant award will enable the school to provide scholarships to 45 students whose parents cannot afford the fees for their children to attend the after-school program. The grant will also allow RBES to transport the 45 scholarship students to their homes at the conclusion of each school day.

Money from the grant will enable RBES to add dance, drama, visual arts and team-building programs to the after-school program.

RBES will implement a Run Hard Running Team for students in the after-school program. Students will run twice a week and train to compete in a 5K race while also learning about teamwork, leadership and perseverance.

An academically enriched after-school program plays an important role in ensuring that students, who need assistance, receive the services needed to strengthen their skills and ensure their academic success.

# South Carolina Department of Education 2016 Palmetto Gold and Silver Awards

The South Carolina Department of Education presented Palmetto Gold Awards in February to 18 of Lexington District One's 30 schools, recognizing each school's entire student body's academic performance.

The South Carolina Department of Education's Palmetto Gold and Silver Awards program recognizes schools for overall academic achievement and for closing the achievement gap among historically lower performing groups of students.

The Lexington One schools receiving Gold Awards for general performance are Carolina Springs
Elementary, Gilbert High, Lake Murray Elementary, Lexington Elementary, Lexington High, Lexington Middle, Lexington Technology Center, Meadow Glen Elementary, Meadow Glen Middle, Midway Elementary, New Providence Elementary, Oak Grove Elementary, Pleasant Hill Elementary, Pleasant Hill Middle, Rocky Creek Elementary, Saxe Gotha Elementary and White Knoll High.

White Knoll Middle received a Silver Award for general performance.

In addition to their Palmetto Gold Awards for general performance, two schools, **Lake Murray Elementary** and **New Providence Elementary**, received Palmetto Gold Awards for closing the achievement gap.

Eight other schools, Lexington Elementary, Lexington Middle, Meadow Glen Elementary, Oak Grove Elementary, Pleasant Hill Middle, Rocky Creek Elementary, Saxe Gotha Elementary and White Knoll Middle, received Palmetto Silver Awards for closing the achievement gap.
