Lexington County School District One will be represented by four all-stars at the upcoming North-South football game.

Gilbert High's Catriez Cook, Lexington High's Gunnar Kennedy and Cameron Williams, and White Knoll High's Joe Beckett will suit up for the South team this year.

The North-South All-Star Game launched in 1947 as part of the state coaches' clinic in Columbia.

2016 S.C. State Fair First-Place Winner Gilbert High's **Lindsey Berry** proved she has what it takes to win at the state level during the 2016 S.C. State Fair.

Berry ran two horses this year, placing first with one and third with another.

Berry and Dandy finished first in the pole bending competition and second in the arena race. Racing again on Bandit, Berry grabbed third place in the arena race and third in the pole bending competition.

Berry also won third place in barrel racing on Bandit.

After all of the speed events wrapped up, Berry and Dandy won the title of 16 through 18 Speed Event Reserve Champion.




S.C. Council for the Social Studies Thomas Lowell "Tom" **Buckland Memorial Teacher of Excellence Award Winner**

The South Carolina Council for the Social Studies selected Lexington High Social Studies Teacher Jennifer Garrick for the Thomas Lowell "Tom" Buckland Memorial Teacher of Excellence Award.

The SCCSS annually honors the outstanding performance of teachers, college professors, and other worthy individuals and programs promoting quality social studies instruction in the Palmetto State.

A teacher at Lexington District One for 18 years, Garrick currently teaches AP U.S. history and serves as coaching She previously taught world geography, world history, economics, American government, AP American government and U.S. history.



After winning the award, Garrick earned a nomination for an award from the National Council for the Social Studies.

"Through her love of the profession and her passion for her subject matter, she creates a learning environment where excellence and caring are the norm," said LHS Principal Melissa Rawl.

The S.C. Council of the Social Studies Board of Directors elected Garrick as elected vice president in September.

University of Chicago Outstanding Educator

A Lexington High teacher inspired former students so much that they nominated him for a prestigious award.

In October, Social Studies Teacher Derek Allison received the University of Chicago's Outstanding Educator Award, an honor given by the University of Chicago's Office of College Admissions.

A veteran public educator, Haggard was elected in 2012 after retiring as principal of Pelion High.

He previously served as the hospital's Vice President of Patient Safety and Quality from 2009 to 2011.

A father to three Lexington District One students, Powers received a bachelor's degree in chemistry from Wake Forest University, a doctorate of medicine from Bowman Gray School of Medicine and a Master of Business Administration in finance from Babcock Graduate School of Management.

Powers is a member of Mt. Horeb United Methodist Church where he serves as facilitator and member of adult small group ministries and a volunteer in vacation Bible school. He also served as a member of the Finance Committee.
