Ledell Wins Multiple Track and Field Awards

At the end of his high school career, a River Bluff High student cemented his legacy by adding two more state titles and a national title to his lengthy list of accomplishments.

Senior **Desmond J. Ledell** won the triple jump event at the New Balance Nationals Outdoor on June 17 in Greensboro. He jumped a personal best 50'6" and was also named an All-American.

During the South Carolina track and field championships on May 12–13, Ledell brought home two major victories. Competing in the 5A triple jump competition, Ledell made history as the first and only South Carolina student-athlete to claim the triple jump state title four times. In his final triple jump event as a Gator, Ledell made a 49'1" jump to claim the title.

The previous day, Ledell also won a state title with a 23'10" jump in the 5A long jump event, improving on his fourth-place long jump finish from last year.

Additionally, Ledell won the Gatorade South Carolina Boys Track and Field Player of the Year award, an honor reserved for the nation's most outstanding high school athletes. Ledell plans to continue his track and field career at Clemson University.





South Carolina Speech and Theatre Association 2017 Middle School Festival First-Place Winner

Pleasant Hill Middle School Eighth-Grader **Kathryn D. Capili** commanded the stage at a state drama competition this spring. Capili competed at the South Carolina Speech and Theatre Association's Middle School Festival alongside hundreds of South Carolina theater students, taking first place in Solo Acting with her performance.

Capili has also been accepted into the South Carolina Governor's School of the Arts and Humanities' Summer Discovery program.

2017 National Merit Scholarship Winners

Four Lexington District One seniors, **Sergei O. Alexeev**, **John M. Clemens**, **Ratna H. Patel** and **Sydney J. Womack**, won prestigious National Merit scholarship offers.

Lexington High's Ratna H. Patel and River Bluff High's Sydney J. Womack each received a \$2,500 National Merit Scholarship as part of the 2017 National Merit Scholarship Program.

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation chose Patel and Womack from a group of more than 15,000 finalists. Winners must have an extensive list of academic and community service accomplishments, high marks on standardized tests, a memorable personal essay and a recommendation written by a high school official.

Patel plans to pursue a career in neurology, while Womack will study biomedical engineering.

Lexington High's Sergei O. Alexeev and White Knoll High's John M. Clemens received National Merit Scholarships financed by the college they plan to attend. Colleges and universities fund approximately 3,200 scholarships from \$500 to \$2,000 annually for up to four years of undergraduate study.

Alexeev plans to study medicine at the University of South Carolina, while Clemens will pursue civil engineering at Clemson University.

This year's National Merit Scholarship Program began in October 2015 when more than 1.6 million juniors from across the country took the Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test.





2017 5A Region Coaches of the Year

Two Lexington District One coaches received recognition for outstanding leadership and winning seasons. River Bluff High Head Baseball Coach Mark Bonnette and White Knoll High Head Softball Coach April Farr were named 5A Region Coaches of the Year, awards voted on by their fellow coaches.

RBHS baseball came up just one game short in their quest for the school's first baseball state championship. Under Bonnette's leadership, the Gators finished the season with a record of 29–7, winning lower state, region and district championships.

The WKHS Timberwolves also chalked up the same remarkable run. Though they ended their season as runners-up for the state title, the team claimed a region championship, district championship and lower state championship on their way to a 28–4 record.

2017 South Carolina Baseball Coaches Association North-South All-Stars





2017 South Carolina National Archery in the Schools Program High School State Champion

Aiming and hitting the bull's-eye multiple times, Klotz shot the highest individual score of any female at the 12th annual South Carolina National Archery in the Schools Program State Championship, held March 30. Shooting a 292 out of a possible 300, she tallied the highest score of anyone, male or female, at the high school state tournament.

Klotz followed up her impressive shooting at the state level with a trip to the 2017 National Archery in the Schools Program Nationals on May 11. Among 11th–grade girls, she finished 38th out of 510 competitors with a score of 285 out of 300.

Klotz began competing in archery three years ago.





2017 South Carolina National Archery in the Schools Program IBO 3-D Challenge Middle School State Champion

Carolina Springs Middle's **Sarah E. "Alex" Thomas** showed impressive poise and adaptability when competing in the 2017 South Carolina National Archery in the Schools Program IBO 3-D Challenge Middle School State Championship.

As a first-year competitor, Thomas finished first in the 3-D event. In competition, she shot six different 3-D targets representing sheep, turkey, coyote, antelope, deer and bear. She topped 66 other middle school students with a score of 285 out of 300.

During the 2017 National Archery in the Schools Program National IBO 3-D Challenge held May 11, Thomas scored 267 to finish 136th out of 764 female middle school competitors.
