Wrestlers draw state championships, all-star bids

Lexington District One student-athletes wrapped up their season on the mat with state title runs and all-star recognition.

The district's newest state champions in boys wrestling include Lexington High's **Jacob L. Brasseur** and White Knoll High's **Selwyn D. Porter**. Both also earned recognition as North-South All-Star wrestlers as did LHS's **Pierce W. Clinger** and River Bluff High's **Ben A. Emery**.

Brasseur's second state title in two years capped off a record-setting high school career. Winning an 11-5 decision for the Class 5A 120-pound championship, Brasseur finished as LHS's all-time wins leader with a 209-9 record. In his four seasons as a Wildcat, he finished third at state as a freshman and runner-up as a sophomore. The S.C. Wrestling Coaches Association voted Brasseur 5A Senior Wrestler of the Year.

Also standing on top of the podium at the state tournament, Porter won the Class 5A 145-pound title. He wrestled the reigning Upper State champion and defending state champion, RBHS's Emery, to give WKHS its first 5A wrestling title in school history. He finished his senior campaign with a 55-5 record.

Brasseur, Clinger, Emery and Porter received invitations to wrestle against South Carolina's best seniors at the S.C. Wrestling Coaches Association's 2018 Best Western North-South All-Star Wrestling Classic, held March 2 and 3.

Emery finished as the state runner-up in Class 5A 145-pound, with an overall record of 50-3 for his senior season.

Clinger had an overall record of 34-17 this season and went 1-1 during the all-star weekend.

Gilbert High singers perform at regional showcase

Phipps won a Scholastic Art and Writing Awards Gold Key for her entry titled "Galactic Pond." As a Gold Key winner, her photograph becomes eligible for judging at the national level.

Presented by the Alliance for Young Artists and Writers, the Scholastic Art and Writing Awards celebrate student artists, writers, filmmakers, photographers, poets and sculptors. Students receive opportunities for scholarships as well as having their work exhibited or published.

The National Federation of State High School Associations named Lexington High's **C. Brandon Smith** as South Carolina Boys Golf Coach of the Year for his leadership of the Wildcats.

SCAAA honors Lexington One administrators

Three Lexington District One administrators received accolades from the South Carolina Athletic Administrators Association, while another earned a South Carolina High School League award recently.

Superintendent Gregory D. Little, Ed.D., won the 5A/4A SCAAA Superintendent of the Year award. Lexington District One's Director of Athletics David Bennett praised Dr. Little for his support of Special Olympics athletes, renovations to women's athletic facilities and his frequent "rock star" visits with students.

GHS Athletic Director **Chad J. Leaphart** took the SCAAA's Region 5 3A Athletic Director of the Year, an award voted on by Region 5 coaches. Leaphart led the GHS football team to a historic undefeated regular season in 2017. The Indians powered their way into the third round of the playoffs, losing in the 3A Lower State semifinals to end their season with a 12-1 record.

SCAAA honored Lexington High's **Melissa C. Rawl** with the 5A Principal of the Year award. LHS became a National Unified Champion School for its support of Special Olympics athletes in 2017 and was among the first schools in South Carolina to award athletic letters to Special Olympics athletes.

The accolades for LHS continued as the South Carolina High School League awarded Athletic Director **W. Perry Woolbright** with an Award of Excellence for Exemplary Display of Sportsmanship, Ethics and Integrity.




Johnson earns basketball all-star



The following six years featured LES teachers and administrators visiting other IB elementary schools and attending IB workshops, adding parents to the discussion and incorporating the IB Learner Traits into the school's everyday routines.

LES achieved IB candidacy status in fall 2016 and received an IB consultant in March 2017. Once the school submitted its application, a team of IB educators conducted an inspection by observing classrooms, interviewing stakeholders, and assessing curricular units and student work samples.
